Mike Geisel has been selected by the Mayor and City Council as Chesterfield's next City Administrator.

Mr. Geisel has spent nearly 28 years serving the city of Chesterfield. He first was appointed in 1988 as the Assistant City Engineer, was promoted to the Director of Public Works and then the Director of Public Services. As Director

of Public Services, Mr. Geisel was responsible for planning and zoning; engineering; street and sewer maintenance; fleet services; buildings and grounds; and parks, recreation and arts. Prior to joining Chesterfield, Mr. Geisel worked for the cities of Maryland Heights and St. Charles, as well as the Georgia Power Company. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Missouri-Rolla and a Master's in Business Administration from the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

"We are impressed by Mr. Geisel's credentials and experience, are fully supportive of his appointment and have every confidence in his ability to serve the city of Chesterfield. 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Greetings and happy holidays!

There are many topics I would like to mention to keep you abreast of changes and improvement within our city and at City Hall.

Transparency Portal

In furthering our efforts to be transparent in financial matters, there is a transparency portal on the home page of the city's website. Upon clicking on this tab, the public can gain access to an array of budgetary information including the annual budget, employee salaries, and much more. Transparency for City Council business can be accessed by clicking on Agendas/Minutes. In general, I would add that there is a wealth of information that is posted and periodically updated on the website for those who are able to spend a little time exploring.

Budget Review

Shortly after our newly appointed City Administrator Mike Geisel took over, the City Council and I were provided an economic briefing by our Director of Finance, Craig White. This picture suggested that, although the city is healthy financially, we could no longer continue to spend money in the same manner as in recent years and expect to meet future financial obligations. A series of budget review meetings were scheduled to allow Councilmembers to review our budget in a more in-depth manner. At this writing, it appears that there will likely be a significant reduction in funding of third party organizations or events, especially if a public purpose cannot be clearly identified. Also, following several years of providing employee merit increases well above annual CPI advances, the city may engage a consultant to perform a comprehensive

analysis of the total compensation package in relationship to the market.

Senator Dave Schatz

The next thing I would like to address is the appreciation all Chesterfield residents should have for State Senator Dave Schatz. With the passage of HB 1561, sponsored by State Representatives Sue Allen and Mike Leara, Chesterfield will now benefit by being able to keep 50% of the pool tax that is generated in our city. Although it was the House Bill that was eventually signed by the governor, Senator Schatz sponsored an identical bill in the Senate that was also passed by both Houses. In my mind, he demonstrated that he is a principled legislator who was willing to spearhead and take on this issue. Due to the fragmented legislative districting, Senator Schatz is one of three senators that represent a portion of Chesterfield. I strongly believe that Senator Schatz deserves the loyalty of Chesterfield voters.

Ward 4 Council Vacancy

We currently have an anticipated City Council vacancy in Ward 4. Councilmember Bruce DeGroot was the victor in the November general election. We congratulate him and thank him for his service to the city of Chesterfield. Upon Bruce's resignation, it will be my privilege (with the approval of a majority of remaining Councilmembers) to appoint a successor, who would serve until the upcoming April election. So, if any Ward 4 residents may be interested in serving, please let me know of your interest.

Bus stop shelters, finally!

After a two and a half year effort, there will finally be eight passenger shelters installed at various bus stops in Chesterfield Valley. These will be funded by the Chesterfield Valley Transportation Development District (TDD) at a cost of \$130,432. The TDD is completely separate from the city of Chesterfield budget and has funded many transportation related projects in the Valley and is supported by a 3/8 cent Valley-wide sales tax.

Nomination Guidelines

- One nomination per person per household (spouses can be nominated jointly).
- Previously nominated individuals can be re-nominated.
- A nominee cannot serve on the Selection Committee.
- A nominee cannot serve in an publicly elected position.
- The person nominating an individual cannot serve on the Selection Committee.
- City employees will not be considered for the award.

Nominations can be submitted electronically by filling out the form at chesterfield.mo.us and are due no later than February 3, 2017. The winner will be selected by a committee of residents and awarded at a City Council meeting in March.

New senior transportation service ITNGateway coming to West-and Mid-County

The lack of senior transportation services in the region has been identified as a need to address by Chesterfield's Older Adult Task Force and was also identified in St. Louis County's Age Friendly Community Action Plan. Over the past several months, a steering committee was

formed with input from other communities in the West-and Mid-County regions to address this deficiency for routine transportation services for seniors, resulting in the offering of a new transportation option for area residents.

Independent Transportation Network (ITN) is a national non-profit transportation system that has been in existence for over 20 years, meeting the transportation needs of America's aging population. It currently operates a very successful operation in St. Charles County and will be expanding service to a defined area in St. Louis County. ITN is membership-based and utilizes volunteer drivers to provide affordable, high-quality, door-through-door and arm-through-arm services for seniors aged 60 and over and adults who are visually impaired. Individuals purchase annual memberships for \$50 or \$75 per couple and are provided rides to anywhere they want to go within the service area for any reason, 24 hours, 7 days a week at a cost of only \$1.50 per mile with a \$2.50 pick-up fee. No money ever exchanges hands with the drivers and customers receive a monthly itemized statement.

Filing for Mayor and City Council will begin on December 13

On Tuesday, December 13, at 8 a.m., candidate filing for the Office of Mayor, to serve a four-year term, and the Office of Councilmember, in each of the city's four (4) Wards, to serve a two-year term, will begin in the City Clerk's office at City Hall. After December 13, hours for filing during the candidate filing period will be 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Candidate filing will close Tuesday, January 17, 2017 at 5 p.m. The election will be held April 4, 2017.

Qualifications

To run for the Office of Mayor, candidates must be at least 30 years of age, a citizen of the United States and a resident of the city at the time of election for two (2) years prior to the election. To run for a seat on the City Council, candidates must be at least 21 years of age prior to taking office, a citizen of the United States, an inhabitant of the city for one (1) year prior to the election and a resident of the Ward for which they are running for six (6) months prior to the election. The services provided include everything from permit reviews, land use research, zoning analysis, site plan reviews and comprehensive planning and mapping services to community outreach and support to homeowners and business owners alike. The Planning & **Development Services Department strives** to provide the outstanding service and community support to enhance the quality of life, environment and growth for the citizens of Chesterfield.

This year's theme for National Community Planning Month is Civic Engagement. For Chesterfield, public input and civic engagement is at the core of what we do and why we do it. RIGHT-OF-WAY

Did you know the area between the sidewalk and curb is considered public right-of-way? Any construction or physical disturbances within the public right-of-way, including sprinkler systems, invisible fences, the planting or removal of trees and driveway replacements, requires a permit from the Public Services Department. If a street does not contain sidewalk, the public right-of-way is typically considered the area within twelve feet of the back of curb.

Movable objects should not be kept in the public right-of-way, including basketball goals and decorative landscape boulders. If you have any questions regarding an object in the public right-of-way, please call 636.537.4762.

WATER QUALITY

Did you know that in order to permit grading and land disturbance activities, the city of Chesterfield-along with 58 other municipalities, St. Louis County, and MSD-operate under a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources? Permit requirements cover a wide range of topics which impact water quality, including posting pet waste disposal signs, ensuring that development sites contain proper silt and erosion control, and biannual street sweeping. Additionally, the city must operate its facilities in such a manner to minimize exposure to storm water and train its personnel annually in proper water quality practices.

If you are wondering what you can do to improve water quality, remember that all storm water inlets drain to creeks and streams. Please ensure that no trash, yard waste, debris or chemicals are washed or dumped into storm water inlets. Additionally, if you are planning a grading project, please contact the city to determine whether a permit is necessary.

Tree Guide assists residents with recommended tree species and proper care

This is a cost-sharing program and homeowners are required to submit \$100 for each tree applied for, with the city covering the remaining amount needed to plant the tree. Trees will be planted each spring and fall, but applications can be submitted anytime. Applications received before January 31, 2017 will be eligible for spring planting; applications received before August 31, 2017 will be eligible for fall planting. The Street Tree Planting Program will plant over 300 trees this fall, doubling the 2014 fall planting record of 140 trees. For all parties that have applied or are interested in the Street Tree Planting Program, please note:

- If you would like the location moved after the flag has been placed, please call 636.537.4000 as soon as possible. Trees will not be moved after they have been planted.
- The city's contractor is responsible for calling in utility locations.
- It is the homeowners responsibility to locate irrigation lines under planting site.

- After locations have been marked and
 utilities located, the tree will be planted within the next couple months. Please be
 patient and leave the flags in place until the tree is planted.
- The contractor will water the tree when it is planted. Afterwards, it is the homeowners responsibility to water the tree. The one-year warranty does not cover trees that do not receive proper care as described in the Tree Guide (see link below).
- Please read the Tree Guide carefully to ensure every effort is made to provide the first choice of tree species. Please note that availability of one particular species cannot be guaranteed. In this case, the city will plant the second or third choice, as needed.
- The city inspects each tree after it is planted to determine that the tree meets specifications. A second inspection will be completed before the one-year warranty period, and the contractor will replace any trees that have died or are in poor condition.

Invasive Bush Honeysuckle no match for scouts

Nearly 40 Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and their leaders joined members of Citizens Committee for the Environment on Saturday, October 22 at Faust Park to remove and eradicate invasive bush honeysuckle and other invasive plants from Governor Bates' Prairie. While it might smell good in the spring, this type of honeysuckle is a detriment to the environment because it rapidly spreads and secretes chemicals into the soil that kills other plants, thus reducing habitats for wildlife, such as butterflies. The volunteers removed five dump-truck loads of the invasive plant, resulting in an improved quality of nature in the park.

West County Family Y helps butterflies and enhances the Wildlife Community Habitat

The West County Family Y's native butterfly garden was installed in October with the help of various National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Community Wildlife Habitat Partners, including The Butterfly House, Greenscape Gardens, Pure Air Natives, Girl Scout Troop #1050, Y staff, city Councilmember Guy Tilman and members of the Citizens Committee for the Environment. This garden effort culminated a week of education at the Y for sustainable gardening practices, especially for butterflies. It is located behind the Y, along the trail that circles the lake in Central Park.

Water - our most precious resource

Did you know that less than 2% of the Earth's water supply is fresh water? Help to restore and conserve Missouri's fresh water and waterways for people and wildlife by keeping fats, oils and grease (FOGs) out of your drains.

FOGs are found in meats, fish, butter, cooking oil, gravy, sauces, mayonnaise, salad dressings, batters, cheeses and food scraps. FOG sticks to the inside of sewer pipes and restricts wastewater flow, causing blockages. To avoid this, cool all fats, oils and grease in empty cans, secure the lids and place cans in trash when full.

MSD blockages are costly, can cause sewer overflows that damage the system and pollute our waterways.

There are a limited number of can lids available at City Hall, which are available on a first-come-first-serve basis.

TIPS ON CONSERVING WATER

- Avoid running water down the drain when there may be another use for it such as watering plants or cleaning.
- Water your lawn only when it needs it in the morning or in the early evening.
- Take short showers instead of baths.
 A full bathtub requires about 36 gallons of water.
- Store drinking water in the refrigerator rather than letting the tap run every time you want a cool glass of water.
- Don't leave the water running when brushing your teeth or shaving. Get in the habit of turning off the water when it's not being used.

The service is provided by volunteers and some part-time paid drivers, who are screened with a criminal background check and motor-vehicle check. Drivers provide references, are thoroughly interviewed, screened and trained. Friendly volunteers will take passengers for any reason, anywhere, anytime within the service area.

Utilizing data provided by St. Louis
County, concentrated population areas
of older adults (25% of the population
or more) were found along the Westand Mid-County corridor. Therefore,
for the pilot program, the service
area will generally be Highway 109/
Edison to the west, Manchester Road
to the south, Page Avenue to the north
and McCausland/Skinker to the east.
Residents living within specific zip
codes within those boundaries are
eligible for the service. After an 18
month trial period, expansion of the
service area will be considered.

The target start date for the program is spring of 2017. Currently, ITNGateway is raising funds and seeking grants for operational costs for the service. Business owners who would benefit from senior transportation can help facilitate this program by making charitable contributions. Volunteer drivers are also being sought, with a minimum commitment of only five hours per month. Volunteers can earn credits that other family members or friends can use for ITN's services or can get reimbursed for mileage. 

Wilmas family built strong influence in Chesterfield and St. Louis County

The Wilmas family members were active Chesterfield farmers as well as participants in St. Louis County government. The parents of Anton Wilmas emigrated from Germany to the United States in the late 1830s. Toward the end of 1848, they moved to St. Louis County with their three year old son, Anton (1845-1921). On January 31, 1871, Anton married Louise Reinke (b. 6 Jan 1853, d. 10 Nov 1925). She was the daughter of John Dietrich Reinke (1821-1910) and Luise Wilhilmine Kleinsorg (1828-1883). Dietrich Reinke was one of the original Ballwin pioneers. He owned a farm on Clarkson Road where Louise and her two brothers and four sisters grew up.

Anton's third son, Albert August (b. 4 Nov 1870, d. 15 Jan 1949) was the first Wilmas to live in Chesterfield. He married Amelia Schag (b. 24 Aug 1875 in Orville, MO, d. 6 Dec 1939) on March 18, 1898. They spent the first years of their marriage in Ellisville. In 1906, Albert purchased hill property, located near Wild Horse Creek Road and Santa Maria Drive, on which he built a house and barn overlooking the city of Chesterfield. Albert served as Director of the Chesterfield School Board and was active in Republican politics for more than 30 years. In 1913, he was elected Judge of the County Court from the Second District. Two years later, he became a Collector of Revenue for St. Louis County. He served two four-year terms from 1915-1923. The next year, he was elected County Sheriff and served until 1928. After leaving public office, Albert Wilmas spent the next 12 years cultivating his farm land in the Missouri River Bottoms. He became known as one of the largest potato growers of the area.

Albert and Amelia had two children: Clifford Albert (b. 20 Nov 1899, d. 18 Nov 1989) and Vervivon Regina (b. 9 Aug 1902). Clifford attended Chesterfield School and Mrs. Griffith's Sunday school class at the Chesterfield Baptist Church. Both were located on Wild Horse Creek Road. He married Ethel Jo Walker (b. in Lake, MO, d. 3 Sept 1977) on November 27, 1924. Cliff became a well known Chesterfield farmer. He acquired the 225-acre Charles Andreas' farm. Like his father, he grew many acres of potatoes. He also produced corn, cantaloupe and wheat. After several years of drought and floods, he retired from farming. For a time, he worked as a deputy tax collector for Willis Benson in the St. Louis County tax collector's office in Clayton. In 1974, he took a part-time position at the Washington University Tyson Research Center, where he worked until his death in 1989.

Clifford and Ethel Jo Wilmas had two daughters: Marian Jane (b. 25 Dec 1925) and Marjorie Ann (b. 16 Feb 1919, d. 25 Nov 2001). Marian married Clarence Hackmann, Jr. of Creve Coeur and they resided in Chesterfield. Marjorie married George O'Rourke of High Ridge.

Some of the Wilmas family is buried in St. John's Lutheran Cemetery in Ellisville and others are buried in Bellerive Heritage Gardens in Creve Coeur. The Wilmas' provided food and services to Chesterfield and the wider community.
