Storage Needs



As you know, we have been discussing storage needs and disposition of materials possessed by the Historical Commission for an extended period of time. The purpose of this memo is to suggest a process and framework to gather the fragmented collection of materials identified by the Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee and its predecessors, as well as to develop recommendations as to the final disposition of these materials.

It should be recognized that we simply do not have any sizable climate controlled storage space available at City Hall. Our lower level warehouse and storage area is heated, but not cooled. The only space even remotely close to this size would be the archive area and it is already over-flowing. The recent tank and equipment for the solar-thermal project has also consumed a great deal of space and caused staff to relocate and consolidate warehouse inventory.

In reviewing the expressed storage needs, there are some obvious strategies that should be considered. There are three distinct types of storage needs;

- 1) Office and on-going operational supplies. These are file cabinets, files, letterhead, envelopes, current calendars or current books, digital recorders, cassette tape recorder, materials, or items that the CHC uses repetitively or frequently and needs regular access to. Such items could be stored in a file cabinet or designated area and accessed by the committee liaison regularly as necessary.
- 2) <u>Warehouse storage items</u>, e.g. bricks, building materials, books, inventories of calendars or publications, etc. which can be effectively stored in an un-tempered covered secure storage location, An example of which would be the large storage room at the Public Works Facility.
- 3) Artifacts which readily degrade and require tempered space, such as Historic clothing, quilts, curtains, and artwork.

It should also be understood, that under any circumstances, we do not possess museum quality storage space. Further, we have no ability or competency to curate museum quality artifacts. Rodents can and do enter the various storage spaces. Storage spaces are not cooled or heated to standard occupancy Michael G. temperatures. Over time, cloth, paper and similar media will degrade and be damaged. No one should have any expectation that materials stored by the City are adequately preserved or secure. If the artifacts are truly historical, valuable, and worthy of preservation and retention, the City should seriously consider donating such materials to museums or other public collections where curators have the ability to preserve and protect such historical items in the proper way. The City of Chesterfield simply does not have that capability.

It is also obvious that a good deal of the materials that the materials requested to be stored is duplicated with City records. Materials such as newsletters and Annual Reports should be preserved, but no duplicate storage is necessary. These are already part of the official City record. Perhaps staff should ensure that a complete, single collection of these materials exists. It is equally obvious, that once the City officially takes possession of these items, an effort should be made to scan, catalog and make permanent records of such items. Photos, documents, meeting minutes, calendars, newsletters, reports, cassettes and similar materials could easily be systematically digitized and made much more readily accessible, retrievable, and available to a much broader cross section of our public than they are currently. It also recognizes that the digital media is more stable and less subject to degradation over time. As the digital media is created, duplicate copies can be created and stored in different locations to ensure the integrity and preservation of the information. The value of these materials is not derived from retaining the paper or hard copies, but the information provided thereon which could be made significantly more accessible and available to a much broader spectrum of the general public. In fact, perhaps such information could be placed on a web page for those interested. It would require a huge, but beneficial effort by the newly created Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee to scan each document, create meta-data, description, and catalogues of the material before we lose the institutional knowledge of what these items are and what they represent. Once the materials are scanned and catalogued, there is no ongoing need to retain the physical materials and they could be offered and returned to the original donor. If not desired, these materials could then be discarded.

Finally, in perusing the list of items proposed for permanent storage, it is readily obvious that some tough choices and selections must be made to determine whether the items are, in fact, worthy of permanent retention by the City. The City is not a museum and simply lacks the facilities to provide museum quality preservation or the ability to curate historic artifacts. As such, I recommend that staff review the inventory of materials, consult with the Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee, to review existing and proposed historic materials, and subsequently develop a recommendation to the Planning and Public Works Committee of Council relative to a final determinations as to whether or not the City should retain possession of such materials for permanent care and storage. They may also be empowered to recommend that certain materials be loaned, transferred, or donated to other collections or agencies. Proposed future additions to the historic collection should be submitted to the Staff Liaison, a recommendation subsequently be drafted by the

Liaison, and forwarded to the Planning and Public Works Committee of Council for final determination. While we all want to retain mementos, we have to be cognizant that perhaps we might not be able to preserve every item, such as mannequins, meat grinders, watering cans, or even a sled. While important to reflect a period of our history, we have to recognize the physical limitations of the City as well as our core function.

As such, I recommend the following be considered by the Planning and Public Works Committee of Council:

- 1) The Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee and its predecessors gather and transfer all of the materials identified for storage and preservation on behalf of the City.
- 2) The Staff Liaison shall work with the Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee to develop a current and complete inventory of accumulated materials.
- 3) The Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee be tasked with identifying, cataloging, and providing a narrative description for each item.
- 4) The Staff Liaison should evaluate and develop recommendations to the Planning and Public Works Committee relative to the disposition of all inventoried and cataloged items. The recommendations may be developed in prioritized stages in lieu of one global recommendation.
- 5) The Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee, with the assistance of staff, be tasked with scanning, cataloging and make permanent records of such items as photos, documents, meeting minutes, calendars, newsletters, reports, cassettes and other similar materials which could readily be digitized.

While the description of these activities is relatively short, I cannot emphasize the magnitude of initiating this process. It will require a significant level of effort from staff and the members of the Chesterfield Historic and Landmark Preservation Committee. This is a critical and important function which only becomes more daunting over time.

With your concurrence, I'll place this on the agenda for the next meeting of the Planning/Public Works Committee. With the Committee's blessing, we are fully prepared to begin this process. If you have any questions or require additional information, please let me know. OK'A spelis

Chesterfield Historical Commission – Storage Needs



Summary

The Chesterfield Historical Commission (CHC) is currently exploring the availability of a central storage location to satisfy their needs. At present, those items owned by the City that the CHC is responsible, are stored in a number of places; including the basement of City Hall and at various commission members' homes. The CHC is currently awaiting the final publishing and arrival of their book and will thusly require additional storage for this item. As such, it has been requested that the CHC determine their needs for storage and to somehow quantify this property so that a suitable central storage facility can identified and ultimately utilized.

Storage Needs

The CHC requires **250 – 300 sf.** for storage. Most items are boxed and can be easily stacked for more efficient storage. The storage area will need to be climate controlled as a number of the items are textile based and may degrade in a varying environment. Access to this area should be controlled as a number of the items to be stored are valuable; however members of the CHC do not require direct access. Access to this area by members of the CHC need only be by appointment and would not be frequent. As slightly less than half of this space will be devoted to storage of the CHC Book, it is not anticipated that the CHC will generate the need for additional storage in the future.


