UPDATE ONParks Projects

Riparian Trail

Public works has been handling the construction of Phase Two of the Riparian Trail and the portion from August Hill to Wild Horse Creek opened earlier in the month and the final portion is set to open on Monday, November 14th. We are currently working on some erosion issues on the trail

Eberwein Park

Council approved the rebuilding of the trails at Eberwein Park and the Public Works
Department has been working closely with Kozeny Wagner to rebuild the two large loops and install a connection of the two loops just behind the pond. The dam rebuild is complete and grading has begun for the path along the dam plus additional drain connections for some of the trail areas. The eastern loop trail and walk is mostly completed. Progress is moving forward nicely.

Entertainment Plaza


The plaza has been a big hit this summer during concerts and we are accepting bids to have the artificial turf put in. This is a ARPA funded project and we are looking to try to get this to Council prior to the end of the year for their approval.

CVAC Turf Infield Projects

Byrne and Jones has started work on the fields at the CVAC, finish grading, coordinating drain work and adding backer board on some of the fields. In November we should see substantial movement weather permitting on several of the quads. We are running on schedule and on budget.

FALL FESTIVAL




YOU HEAL U YOGA




