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Mayor's Message

A call to action: speak up for your city's right to a fair share

As the saying goes, spring has sprung, and we are looking forward to another year of recreational activities provided by our outstanding Parks & Recreation Division. Speaking of which, I would like to commend and congratulate our staff for the successful application and award of a \$272,000 grant for development and improvement of our newly acquired "River's Edge Park," located adjacent to the Monarch-Chesterfield Levee Trail, behind the Taubman Prestige Outlets. As a reminder, now is the time to renew your membership in our dog park and secure a plot in our community garden.

Help us help you!

As I contemplate what the most important and timely topic is for this issue of our quarterly newsletter, I would like to reiterate how fortunate and unique Chesterfield is and has become as a community within which to live, recreate and do business. The history of our incorporation, the flood, and the resultant recovery/development is truly remarkable and mind-boggling to me.

In spite of our successes, we face a huge challenge which has to do with the redistribution of our sales taxes throughout St. Louis County. As I described and outlined in the December newsletter, the current sales tax system mandates that Chesterfield receives only 6.5% of sales tax dollars generated within our community from the

recently opened outlet malls. This paltry and unfair distribution is not nearly enough revenue to pay for the additional expenses that our City has incurred.

In a more conventional and traditional system, which, by the way, is currently enjoyed by many other cities in St. Louis County and ALL cities throughout the rest of Missouri, our City would receive 100% of this additional tax revenue. Therefore, we are asking for help from our state legislators to fix this unfair, outdated tax system. For your information, we currently project that we will lose approximately 57% of the taxes we generate within Chesterfield to the St. Louis County Sales Tax Pool for redistribution to the county and other cities.

I am asking a favor of each resident and business owner in Chesterfield. That favor is to write a letter, send an e-mail or make a phone call THANKING our state representatives and state senators for their consideration and assistance in fixing this problem with the St. Louis County "Pool" tax. Your participation is extremely timely, because this legislative session concludes in mid-May. If a large number of Chesterfield residents show their concern regarding this issue, it will assist those legislators committed to helping us solve this problem.

The address for each legislator is their name, followed by their room number, at 201 West Capitol Avenue, Jefferson City, MO 65101. Their e-mail addresses are first.last.name@house.mo.gov or first.last.name@senate.mo.gov. Thanks to the last re-districting, Chesterfield is now crisscrossed by no fewer than SIX State Representative districts and THREE State Senate districts.

As a result, I would suggest that you contact, and thank for their consideration, EACH of the area's legislators listed in the chart to the right. For those of you with email, the task is quickly accomplished by copying and pasting your message for each person. See "shortcut" at top right of the chart.

I realize this is an unusual request, but I think it is worthy of your time and consideration. Many years ago, the Missouri state legislature created this outdated and antiquated tax system and applied it only to St. Louis County cities. Accordingly, it will require today's state legislators to fix it. This is the reason I am asking for your help, in order that Chesterfield can receive a more fair distribution of the tax dollars which are currently generated within our City. 16th Citizens Police Academy set to begin May 12, runs nine weeks

The Chesterfield Police Department is accepting applications for its 16th Citizen's Police Academy.

The program enables participants to learn about various areas of the police operation including patrol procedures, traffic and DWI enforcement, crime scene investigation, and criminal investigations. The program will also include some role-playing activities.

The session will begin on Monday, May 12, and meet once a week for nine weeks from 7-9 p.m.

The academy is open to any person 21 years or older. Classes will meet at the Chesterfield Police Department, 690 Chesterfield Parkway West.

AARP Smart Driver Course scheduled April 8 at City Hall

This is a four-hour course that teaches valuable defensive driving skills, provides a refresher on the rules of the road, safety strategies and tips for adapting one's driving to compensate for changes that may come with aging. It is taught in a single morning session and does not involve a test. Fees are \$15 for AARP members and \$20 for others.

Safety Town registration set for April 16 at City Hall; sessions will begin on June 2

Safety Town is a nationally recognized pre-school safety program which teaches 4, 5 and 6 year-olds about a wide variety of issues, including bicycle safety, water safety, school bus safety and stranger danger. The program includes classroom activities as well as outside hands-on activities in the miniature Safety Town city.

The program is hosted and staffed by the Chesterfield Police Department in cooperation with the Chesterfield Rotary Club, the Chesterfield Kiwanis and the Parkway School District. The program is conducted for six, two-week sessions during the summer months.

Safety Town is one of the department's most popular programs. In addition to commissioned police officers, the Safety Town staff includes teen counselors from area middle and senior high schools who assist the police officers in leading the program. All Safety Town sessions will be held at Parkway Early Childhood Center at 14605 Clayton Rd. in Ballwin.

Registration preference is given to children who have not previously attended a Safety Town session. Fee for the program is \$10.

Native landscaping program discounted for City residents

From the St. Louis Audubon Society

As the weather warms into spring, many residents begin thinking about landscaping improvements and changes. Using native plants appropriately in your landscapes can be an interesting way to add interest, and it brings benefits beyond aesthetics. Native plants are suited for our climate, improve water quality, and best of all, provide habitat for birds and butterflies.

The City of Chesterfield has partnered with the St. Louis Audubon Society to provide the opportunity to improve habitat for birds within residents' own landscapes at a reduced cost. The Bring Conservation Home Program provides habitat restoration advice at residential yards by Habitat Advisors trained in a variety of conservation practices for suburban landscapes. The program fee, currently \$50, has been reduced to \$25 for Chesterfield residents.

The Bring Conservation Home program envisions an ever-growing mosaic of small, private nature sanctuaries for birds, butterflies, and other animals, helping to reverse the population decline of many species and inspire families with nature encounters at home. Habitat Advisors will perform a landscape survey and provide you with a written report detailing simple steps to improve the habitat value. A follow-up visit can be performed upon request, and with

compliance to the initial recommendations, residents can earn one of three different levels of achievement – silver, gold, or platinum. Once certified, residents have the option of acquiring a yard sign that highlights the accomplishment.

“Stepping beyond our traditional landscapes of turf grass and ornamental plants can be challenging even for a seasoned gardener,” said Mitch Leachman, St. Louis Audubon Society Executive Director. “The rewards, however, are amazing and can include Monarch butterfly and songbird migration, pollination, predation, and even courtship behavior – all courtesy of native plants in your own landscape.”

Interested residents should apply with the St. Louis Audubon Society at www.stlouisaudubon.org/BCH/. After receipt of application, the resident will be contacted to schedule a visit by a habitat technician.

City gardening contest will reward the creation of natural habitats

As a homeowner, you can qualify for Chesterfield's Family Gardening Grow-Off by creating a new garden that helps restore habitat for pollinators, birds, & butterflies! Gardens can be planted in any part of your yard, but they must be planted and maintained by the homeowners, rather than a professional service.

This competition begins on March 13 and runs

through March 13, 2015, allowing a year for the garden to mature or for those planting fall gardens to join in. Participants can compete in large- and small-garden categories to win a variety of prizes, including a membership to the Missouri Botanical Garden and gift certificates to local nurseries. After being evaluated by the City's arborist, the winners will be announced in October 2015 and recognized at a City Council meeting.

Applicants who apply at the 23rd annual Earth Day Festival on April 26 will receive a Native Gardening starter kit consisting of five native plants from Grow Native plus planting and other educational information. Supplies are limited to the first 12 applicants.


Monthly electronics recycling returns on fourth Saturdays

Other items collected include all sizes of reusable clothes, shoes, toys and baby items that will be donated to families in need.

The e-cycling collection site will be located at east end of the Chesterfield Valley Athletic Complex, north of the Parks & Recreation Building parking lot at 17891 North Outer 40. Items can be dropped off the fourth Saturday of the month, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. There will be a fee of \$5 for small televisions, \$10 for large, and \$15 for console or larger, with a limit of two per household.

Hill, Eberwein names live on

Many of the places and street names in Chesterfield commemorate families who settled here.

Hill

The August Hill family is one example. A shopping center, a housing development, and two streets bear the Hill name. August Hill, Sr. (b. 1814, d. 1890) and his wife, Maria E. Weinrich (b. 1823, d. ?) arrived in the Chesterfield area of Bellefontaine around 1837. They purchased farmland along Olive and Clarkson roads for \$18,000 from a man named Humphreys and hired Otto Nelkier to build their house. Chesterfield Mall now occupies this site. The area along Olive/Clarkson Roads became known as Hilltown in honor of August Hill, Sr., and today a shopping center on Olive Boulevard bears the name Hilltown Village. August and Maria had three children – Ernst, Mary and Augusta. In 1888, Ernst married Mary Woerther, and they also had three children – August E., Ernst V., and George E.

August E. (d. 1971) and his wife Lydia (d. 1963) continued to live on his grandfather August's property called Orchard Hill Farm. While August farmed, Lydia taught school at Melrose, Bellefontaine, and Fern Ridge schools. Since Lydia's teaching positions left her husband in need of help, Donald Karl, a teenager who lived with the Hills, took over feeding chickens, milking cows, trimming fruit trees, and performing various other chores. During the summers, Lydia sold peaches from a roadside stand near their house. Today, you can find August Hill Road off Baxter Road, Lydia Hill Drive off Chesterfield Parkway West, and August Hill, a development of attached homes, on Conway Road.

Eberwein

Have you been to the City of Chesterfield's

Eberwein Dog Park? It occupies the site of the former Eberwein Farm on Old Baxter Road, south of Clarkson. You can still see the original red farm barn at the dog park. In 1878, that farm covered 427 acres south of the present I-64 between Schoettler and Baxter roads.

Henry Zacharias Eberwein arrived by ship in New Orleans from Gottingen Prewsen, Germany, in 1835 and bought his farm property the same year. He built his second farmhouse in the 1850s and lived there until his death in 1888. That house still stands on Old Baxter Road, across from the dog park. The youngest of Henry's sons, Ernst Eberwein (b. 1852, d. 1939), built the 1895 white farmhouse, which, with the remaining barn, was purchased by the City of Chesterfield for a park in 2009.



New WWII book raises funds for Chesterfield's Honor Park

Proceeds from a book about area residents' experiences in WWII will go to the construction of Chesterfield's Honor Park.

Why We Fought – Nazi Camp Liberators of St. Louis, edited by Chesterfield resident Mark W. Leach, features accounts by locals involved in WWII: 5 Holocaust survivors, 7 POWs, and 27 Nazi camp liberators. Revenue from books purchased at Chesterfield City Hall will go to build the proposed park, which is to be constructed in Central Park near the entrance to the Amphitheater to honor those who served in this country's armed forces.



A statement from the book's back cover sets the stage: "The victorious spring of 1945 unexpectedly brought two vastly different groups together in the midst of battle. One group was made up of soldiers from the most powerful and affluent nation in the world. The other was Hitler's 'undesirables,' mostly impoverished people who'd been born and raised under persecution and oppression. On the surface, the two groups couldn't have been more different. In reality, they had a great deal in common. Both had been torn away from their lives and dreams by powerful forces beyond their control. Both had suffered their own versions of hell, complex mixtures of horrors, lost lives, and noble acts of bravery and sacrifice. The soldiers rarely talk about the war. Yet as some people have begun to deny the horrors of the Holocaust, the liberators of St. Louis have come forward to set the record straight. This is their story."

Several of the people featured in the book have

ties to Chesterfield. Holocaust survivor Ben Fainer lives in Creve Coeur but for a number of years owned a business in Chesterfield's Hog Hollow area. Long time Chesterfield resident Frank Huelskoetter was captured during the Battle of the Bulge and spent the remainder of the war as a prisoner in Germany. Lastly, David Lupo, who was among the soldiers who first opened the gates of Dachau, also resides in Chesterfield. A chapter devoted to how German and Italian prisoners were treated at camps in the St. Louis area, including the camps that existed in the Chesterfield Valley, stands in stark contrast to the horrendous treatment of prisoners held in Nazi camps.

Huelskoetter says this of his capture: "So after the Germans got us all lined up, they march us down the road. There was a road leading out of the town, and they march us down the road, maybe, a quarter of a mile and then stop us, and tell us to stand off to the left in the field, there. And then a German truck came up, and we thought, 'Oh, they're going to take us somewhere now.' But, instead they unloaded machine guns. And they set up the machine guns on the road facing us as we were standing in the field, there. And at this point, why, I figured, 'They're going to shoot us. And this is the end of the war and the end of me, too.'"

More history

Books on Chesterfield's history can be purchased at City Hall. They include *Chesterfield's Ancient Past* (paperback) for \$15 and *Chesterfield Missouri, From Untamed Wilderness to Thriving Municipality* (hardback) for \$25.

Ernst married Estella Kummer, and they raised their four children on the farm. The Eberwein children went to the one-room Bellefontaine School on Conway Road in Chesterfield, currently the August Hill gated development. Since I-64/US 40 had not yet been constructed, it would have been easy for the kids to run from the Eberwein Farm across the valley to the school on Conway. Where did the family shop? Their groceries came from Rinkel's Market where Charlie Gitto's Restaurant is now. There were no department stores or malls so everything else came from either Sears or Montgomery Ward catalogs.



Construction ahead

City plans improvements to streets and roads

2014 Concrete Slab Replacement


Several residential streets concrete slab replacement projects are expected to be completed this year. Plans call for 35,500 square yards of concrete slabs to be replaced on 14 residential streets. Residents adjacent to the planned replacement areas, along with subdivision trustees, will receive project notification by mail. The streets scheduled for slab replacement are:

Slab replacement work is scheduled to begin this spring and will likely extend into the fall. Additional information will be available under the City Projects tab located on the City's website page.

Asphalt Mill and Overlay

The City of Chesterfield is scheduled to mill and overlay the asphalt pavement on Cochero Drive, Toreador Drive, Bentley Place, and Savonne Court. This project will consist of the removal (milling) of the top portion of the asphalt and the construction of a new asphalt riding surface. Mill and overlay projects are generally constructed fairly quickly, and residents who utilize these streets can expect work to begin in June and be completed in only a few weeks.



Ladue Road Reconstruction

In late 2012, the City acquired the maintenance responsibility for Ladue Road, which was previously a County Arterial Roadway. Prior to this transfer, St. Louis County had obtained a federal grant to resurface Ladue Road. After studying the roadway, the City believes that a concrete reconstruction

would be a more appropriate treatment to Ladue Road at this time. Accordingly, the City plans to reconstruct Ladue Road this year utilizing full depth concrete. This project, estimated at \$2,200,000, will be partially funded through a federal grant (\$1,400,000) and through St. Louis County (\$350,000). Plans are still being finalized, but this project will likely be bid in early spring, with construction commencing in late spring. A public meeting was held in November to discuss this project, and more details will be provided to area residents as information becomes available.

Timberlake Manor Bridge Project

The City will reconstruct the Timberlake Manor Bridge later this year. This project will be funded (80%) through a federal grant obtained by city staff. Easement acquisition was recently finalized, and the project should be bid later this winter. Construction should commence this spring and be finished by the fall.

Upcoming Road projects

The City makes every effort to obtain grants when available. Most recently the City used grant funding to overlay Edison Avenue and to reconstruct Appalachian Trail from Olive to Beaver Creek (Phase I). The City has currently secured grant funding for the following projects:

- Appalachian Trail reconstruction from Beaver Creek to White Road (Phase II) – scheduled for construction in 2015
- South Greentrails Drive reconstruction – scheduled for construction in 2016
- Schoettler Road Bridge – scheduled for construction in 2017

A wider Chesterfield Parkway bridge over I-64 will be constructed beginning this spring

The Chesterfield Parkway West bridge over I-64 will be closed for four months this year for construction of a new, larger replacement.

The bridge takes traffic over I-64 near Chesterfield City Hall to the north and

Chesterfield Mall to the south.

The new bridge will increase the number of lanes from five to eight, with eight-foot sidewalks on both sides of the bridge. Construction on the \$6 million project

is scheduled to start this spring and be completed in early fall.

The project is partially funded by RGA, which will open its new headquarters on Chesterfield Parkway West this fall.

Blue Morpho butterflies return to Faust Park

March brings a special kind of madness to the Sophia M. Sachs Butterfly House –the annual March Morpho Mania. Thousands of breathtaking Blue Morpho butterflies flood the Butterfly House's tropical conservatory.

Native to forests of Central and South America, the Blue Morpho's dazzling, metallic blue is all in the eye of the beholder: their wings are not actually colored blue but are lined with many tiny scales that allow only blue light to escape. And what a sight to behold: thousands of these creatures catching the light in the sunny conservatory.

Despite their opulence, wild Morpho peleides prefer to stay in the forest understory, feeding on fermenting fruit, tree sap, even decomposing animals – keeping their wings folded to avoid catching the eye of would-be predators. But during mating flights, Blue Morphos rise high into the canopy, attracting mates with their iridescent splendor.

Throughout March, visitors will learn about the critical role butterflies play in nature, and how the Butterfly House is involved with butterfly conservation efforts in Costa Rica.

Most visitors to Faust Park have never seen the interior of the historic homes in the park. There's a chance to remedy that this spring in the Historic Homes Open House.

There are three areas with historic homes. The most visible is Faust Historic Village, a collection of homes, barns and other vintage structures that were brought into the park for preservation.

Situated in opposite corners of the park are two original estates. The original Faust family home has been repurposed as part of Webster University School of Music. That leaves what the history staff considers to be the crown jewel of Faust Park – Thornhill. That is the name that Missouri's second governor, Frederick Bates, bestowed on the home he had built, circa 1819. It's now the oldest surviving Missouri governor's home.


