Mayor reflects on past four years

It's been a fast four years! As I reflect on our key city achievements, I am happy to report significant success with fiscal responsibility, the sales tax pool issue, and city transparency.

With the help of our strong City Council, we were able to reduce the annual budget by over \$900,000. We scrutinized employee compensation, reduced the number of takehome vehicles for employees, and cut any expenses which did not directly benefit Chesterfield residents. We continue to view all expenses very critically.

Separately and unrelated to the other financial considerations, we curtailed one year early the collection of the small property tax that we once had. This saved our taxpayers approximately one million dollars and was achieved by setting aside fund reserves over a number of years.

The pool sales tax is a significant issue for Chesterfield and I have reported on any progress several times in this forum. With the passage of House Bill 1561, a cap of 50% was placed on the amount of our sales tax dollars to be distributed to the county pool. saving our city about \$280,000 annually. I was humbled and honored that the Council voted July 18, 2016 as Bob Nation Day in the City of Chesterfield for testifying before the Missouri House and Senate to reform this imbalanced sales tax distribution system. Our ongoing and pending litigation challenging the legality of the pool sales tax system will be moving forward soon. I am hopeful that the judge will decide that the current system is unfair to Chesterfield residents and that the entire county tax

structure can be restructured.

Increased transparency has also been a key priority. With the relatively new appointment of Mike Geisel as our City Administrator, we have worked diligently to keep the public better informed. As an example, our city website now has a readily-accessible transparency portal allowing citizens to view city expenditures, employee salaries, etc. This is another step in the right direction and I am committed to continued improvements in city transparency.

If you have driven by the amphitheater lately, you have probably noticed that our Veterans Honor Park is on its way to completion. What a beautiful tribute this park will be to our veterans! Target completion is in April, with a dedication scheduled for May 3.

A key concern is the future of Chesterfield Mall. You may have read that malls across the country are having tough times with so much online purchasing. With so many stores leaving the mall and the fact that the former owner of the mall chose to stop making payments on their debt, the mall is now in what is called receivership. The court appointed receiver is in the process of determining the best course of action, including pursuing a redevelopment plan. There are many factors that make this a unique challenge. Sears, Macy's, and Dillard's own their own properties and parking lots, use restrictions exist by deed, not to mention other unusual circumstances. Nonetheless, we believe that the property has great value, the demographics of the area are sterling. and there will be a successful outcome that will continue to provide an asset to the City of Chesterfield.

Many of you may have read the headline and article in the Sunday, February 5 Post Dispatch regarding the lease of a vacant lot located at 16559 Old Chesterfield Road. As perplexing as it may be to understand the decision-making and secrecy that took place for many years, I want our residents to know that we have finally released any and all information that the current elected and appointed body **is** aware of relevant to this eight year old lease/purchase options.

I will be asking our City Council to create an ordinance that will preclude any similarly wasteful decision making involving expenditure of taxpayer dollars in the future. As a minimum, a valid and accurate appraisal should need to be obtained before obligating funds for the lease or purchase of real estate.

As embarrassing as this may have been for our city, I want to stress that we are very proud of our employees and the service they perform for our residents and businesses. The decisions made **primarily** by previous elected and appointed officials should not be associated with our employees and their service to our community. I look forward to a very bright future for our city!

And to end on a positive note, our city's strengths far outweigh our challenges, and in 2016 Chesterfield received several recognitions:

Who's knocking on my door?

The arrival of nicer weather often means an increase in solicitors—individuals or groups going door-to-door to sell items or services or to request donations. While this activity is legal in Chesterfield, solicitors are required to obtain a permit and might have to pay a fee. Charitable and religious organizations, as well as political canvassers, are exempt from this requirement. If someone knocks on your door with something to sell or a cause to promote, you have the right to ask to see their permit, which is a one-page document typed on official City of Chesterfield letterhead, and has the city's raised seal affixed to the document. If they are unable produce a permit, you are encouraged to report the person(s) to the Police Department at 636.537.3000. "No Solicitors No Poddlers" stickers are available free of charge at City Hall or you can call

PROPERTY TAX FACTS

There are numerous political districts which levy a property tax in the Chesterfield area, so deciphering the tax bill can be confusing. For an example (see left), we used a \$300,000 home value and applied the 2016 tax rates for a resident in the Parkway School District and Monarch Fire Protection District. If you live in the Rockwood School District, however, the district's rate is \$4.6678 resulting in \$2,661 in taxes received by the school district.

The city has not assessed a property tax since 2014. In total, different entities including St. Louis County, the State of Missouri, school districts, fire districts, and other taxing districts will have collected approximately \$150 million in property taxes from Chesterfield residents and businesses during 2016.

SALES TAX FACTS

Since Chesterfield was incorporated in 1988, the residents have voted to establish two sales taxes: a one-half cent parks tax and one-half cent capital improvement sales tax. In addition to these Chesterfield taxes, the following organizations benefit from Chesterfield's commitment to retail growth (see right).

ST. LOUIS COUNTY PUBLIC SAFETY SALES TAX

St. Louis County has placed "Proposition P" on the April 2017 ballot to impose a ½ percent sales tax for public safety. This tax is projected to generate an estimated \$80,000,000 in new revenue, of which St. Louis County would receive \$46 million and the remaining \$34 million would be shared with the 90+ municipalities based on population.

According to their website, the 2017 county budget for police was \$106,233,785 and the county's overall general fund revenues were \$240,177,550. If passed by a simple majority of voters, the \$46 million influx represents a 43% increase over the 2016 police budget and a 20% increase over the county's total 2017 general fund revenues.

The proposed tax will cost Chesterfield consumers approximately **\$7.2 million** of which an estimated **\$2.4 million** would be returned to the city for police and public safety.

Chesterfield partnership brings new MetroBus stops

On January 25, 2017, Chesterfield Mayor Bob Nation joined Metro transit representatives and St. Louis County Councilman Mark Harder to officially introduce the upgraded bus stops, which feature new shelters, seating, signage and improved Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility. The bus stop enhancement project added new amenities to seven key MetroBus stops in Chesterfield, with an eighth scheduled to receive the enhancements later this year. These upgrades were paid for by the Chesterfield Transportation Development District (TDD).

Four of the upgraded stops are located on Chesterfield Airport Road in Chesterfield Valley, two are on Chesterfield Parkway and one is located on Swingley Ridge Road in front of RGA's facility. The eighth stop, which will receive enhancements later this year, is located south of Chesterfield Mall outside of a new senior living development currently under construction.

Chesterfield continues steady investment in new development

PFIZER RESEARCH FACILITY. Pfizer will be starting work on a new research facility at the intersection of Olive Boulevard and Chesterfield Parkway West. Initial construction will include 262,000 square feet of research space for the company with opportunities for expansion in the future. The \$200 million expansion shows Pfizer's continued commitment in the City of Chesterfield with a new location that will serve the company for years to come.

TOWNEPLACE SUITES. TownePlace Suites will soon begin construction on a 65,000 square foot, 112-room hotel within the Chesterfield Blue Valley Development. Construction is planned to start in May 2017, with an anticipated opening in May 2018. The hotel will benefit from being within a short walk of the recently completed Pecan Legacy Park.

Street improvements scheduled for 2017

GREENTRAILS DRIVE SOUTH. The City of Chesterfield obtained a federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) grant to fund 70% of the costs to reconstruct Greentrails Drive South from Ladue Road to White Road. Construction on this project began in the summer of 2016, and will be completed in the spring of 2017.

CHESTERFIELD PARKWAY EAST

PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE. In 2015, the City of Chesterfield secured a Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant to fund 50% of the costs to construct a pedestrian bridge over I-64 near Chesterfield Parkway East. This project will provide a safe means of crossing I-64 for both pedestrians and bicyclists. Construction on this project began in the summer of 2016, and will be completed in the spring of 2017.

SCHOETTLER ROAD BRIDGE. The city makes every effort to obtain grant monies when available. Most recently the city used grant funding to overlay Edison Avenue, to construct a new bridge on Timberlake Manor Drive, to reconstruct Ladue Road, and to reconstruct Appalachian Trail. In addition to the projects described above, the city has secured grant funding for the replacement of the Schoettler Road Bridge. That project is currently in the right-of-way acquisition phase. Construction is scheduled to commence this summer, if the city is able to obtain the right-of-way necessary to construct the project.

OTHER PROJECTS. The city maintains 176 miles of public roads and nearly 300 miles of sidewalk. However, there are several roads in the city limits which are either private or maintained by other agencies. For example, the Missouri Department of Transportation maintains I-64, Olive/Clarkson Road, Boone's Crossing, Long Road, and parts of Wild Horse Creek Road. St. Louis County maintains Chesterfield Parkway, Baxter Road, White Road, Kehrs Mill Road, Chesterfield Airport Road, parts of Wild Horse Creek Road, and several other roadways. The city is pleased to inform that St. Louis County has plans to improve Chesterfield Parkway West (I-64 to Olive Boulevard) and Kehrs Mill Road in 2017. **For additional information, contact the St. Louis County Department of Transportation at 314.340.4100.**

2017 Concrete slab replacement program

Two concrete slab replacement projects are expected to be completed in 2017. These projects will involve the replacement of 30,000 square yards of concrete slabs on 16 different residential streets. 

Be a good neighbor and a responsible dog owner-pick up after your pet

Every responsible dog owner agrees...picking up after your dog is a must. No matter where or when it occurs, there is NO excuse for not scooping. So here are 10 reasons why every dog owner must be responsible for picking up every time.

- It's the law. Just like littering, it's unlawful NOT to pick up after your dog, and your violation is subject to fine.
- 2. It's common courtesy. Cleaning up after your dog shows respect for your neighbors and your community. Only irresponsible dog owners leave their dog's mess for others to step in or clean up.
- Dog waste is unhealthy. Abandoned dog waste can host diseases and/or parasites which can infect other dogs who come into contact with it, or be transmitted to people who accidentally step in it and track it home. Particularly at risk, are children who play on the ground. Disposing of dog waste immediately helps all dogs stay healthier and reduces feces borne parasites and illnesses.
- Dog waste biodegrades slowly. Some people think it is okay to leave dog waste because it will break down naturally. However, the process is very slow, and, especially in places where the dog population is high, abandoned dog waste can accumulate faster than it breaks down.
- It's not fertilizer! In fact, dog waste impedes landscaping efforts. Leaving dog waste encourages other dogs to mark that spot by urinating over the previous dog's scent.
 - Dog waste pollutes the water. Dog feces, like any feces, contains high levels of nutrients, like nitrogen and phosphorus, which actually pollute the water. Cleaning up after your dog is environmentally responsible. And please don't dispose of dog waste in storm drains: storm drains are
- Dog waste is unsightly. We all deserve to live in a clean city where we can be proud and step lightly.
- Dog waste tops the list of complaints against dogs. More than dog aggression, nuisance barking or unsupervised dogs, most complaints against dogs are about people not cleaning up after their dogs.
- Dog waste makes all dog owners look bad. Every time you don't pick up after your dog, you are giving one more reason for others to dislike dogs and dog owners.
- 10. Your actions set an example for others. When you pick up after your dog, you are part of the solution! And your actions will help convey the message that it's the right thing to do. Consider carrying extra bags to offer to others as a subtle and neighborly hint that cleaning up after our dogs is what responsible dog owners do.

Street Ash tree removal begins work this spring

The Public Works Department maintenance crews will continue removing Ash trees in the public right-of-way (typically the area between the sidewalk and the street), due to the Emerald Ash Borer. Each of the city's 5,500 remaining Ash Trees will be removed over the next six years. The Ash Trees are regularly assessed by the City Arborist, and those trees that are in poor condition are generally removed first. All trees to be removed will be marked with white spray paint near the base of the trunk on the street side. Residents who have a street tree adjacent to their property scheduled for removal will receive notification by mail.

The stump will be removed at a later date by a contractor using a grinding process. Once the stump has been removed, the contractor will backfill and seed the area. Any additional work required is the responsibility of the homeowner. 2nd Annual Family Native Gardening Grow-Off Competition applications due on March 17

Just a reminder that the applications for the 2nd Annual Garden Grow-Off Competition will be accepted until March 17, 2017. The gardens will be reviewed by committee members and/or city staff in late summer of 2017 and a winner announced in the fall. The winner will receive an annual membership to the Missouri Botanical Garden!

Residents can participate in Chesterfield's Family Native Gardening Grow-Off by creating a new garden in your yard that attracts wildlife and helps restore habitat for pollinators, birds, butterflies, and small mammals. Gardens may be planted in any part of your yard with the minimum area of 50 square feet. All gardens MUST be planted and maintained by the homeowners, rather than a professional service.

In addition to the amount and variety of native plants used, the following items will be used as primary criteria for garden evaluation:

- Food sources: native plants, seed producers, berries, fruits, nuts, nectar producers.
- Water sources: pond, stream, water garden, birdbath.
- Cover for animals: mature native trees, thicket/native shrubs, roosting box.
- Nesting places: mature native trees, thicket/native shrubs, other native vegetation, nesting box (birdhouse), pond.



First Baptist Church becomes the cornerstone of worship and education in Chesterfield

The First Baptist Church of Chesterfield (FBCC) celebrated its 170th anniversary on November 20, 2016. According to church pastor Reverend Stubblefield. "the theme for the anniversary celebration was 'Staying Connected through Excellence'." An entire weekend of celebratory activities included: a gospel concert; the annual outreach donation of Thanksgiving baskets; a pictorial directory; a mortgage burning ceremony; and culminated in the Sunday morning worship service with guest preacher Reverend Tonnie Bradford. The gospel concert, comprised of former and current members of the church as a means of "staying connected," was held on Friday, November 18 at 7 p.m. under the direction of Lawrence D. Johnson, FBCC Director of Music and Fine Arts. Touches of Love Delivered, the church's annual outreach mission, delivered over 200 baskets to families in need throughout the greater St. Louis area. The mortgage burning ceremony for the first mortgage on the church's sanctuary took place during the Sunday morning worship service. Finally, quest preacher Bradford, pastor of Friendship Baptist Church, East St. Louis, IL, encouraged the church members to continue to be a "local church with a global mission."

The First Baptist Church of Chesterfield was founded in 1846 when slave owner Leah (Maria*) Long veered from the custom of

having Christian slaves attend church with their owners by granting her slaves a parcel of land in a grassy field. The land, located today at the southeast corner of Chesterfield Parkway West and Wild Horse Creek Road, was divided into two sections. On one section, a roughly hewn log cabin became the first church building and on the other a cemetery was established. Male and female slaves from miles around came to the site to clear the land, hew the logs, and to construct their own place of worship. Besides providing a place for religious services, the church also served as a school where the "Three Rs – Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic" were taught.

By December 1875, the Church had approximately thirty members, who became the legal owners of the property. The deacons at that time were: "Brothers Samuel Harris, Lott Monroe, Pleasant Moore, Squire Green, Samuel Jackson, William Brooks and Samuel Brisco." Sisters Anna Hubbard and Elvira Norris were also important church leaders. "Revivals were held when the farmers were not busy in the fields." Friends and neighbors traveled long distances to worship and socialize together. As time passed, "Rally Day" was held on the third Sunday of June where mass baptisms, along with worship and feasting, were the highlights of the day.

New churches were built on the original site in 1870, 1911 and 1975. However, the Church acquired a new location under the pastorate of Rev. Robert F. Loggins, Sr. He was instrumental in purchasing eleven acres of land on Wild Horse Creek Road. The congregation moved to its new home in August 1996 where it continues to grow. The cemetery was dedicated as a memorial park and it has been nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. Today, "First Baptist Church of Chesterfield continues her commitment to being a blessing to others by committing increasing funds to outreach and missions assisting in disaster relief, crises support for needy families and foreign missions."


