### Dampier honored for discovery of prehistoric village

Stan Dampier was presented with the 2010 Leonard Blake-Chesterfield Ancient History Award by Mayor John Nations and Alice Fugate, Chairperson of the Landmarks Preservation Commission.

Dampier alerted archaeologists to the existence of prehistoric Native American artifacts and village features which were being uncovered while the City of Chesterfield built a stormwater reservoir on 30 recently acquired acres.

His actions led to the excavation of a major prehistoric village site by the Archaeological Research Center of St. Louis.

# Mayor's Farewell Message

It is with very mixed emotions that I write this to you, my final Letter from the Mayor. I will be ending my term on October 18 to become the new President and Chief Operating Officer of Metro. President Pro Tem Barry Flachsbart will become Acting Mayor until April 2011 when there will be an election for the remaining two years of the term to which you elected me in 2009.

It has been one of the great privileges of my life to serve as your Mayor since 2001. When I began, I made a simple pledge to all of you that I would work to have a city and a city government of which you could rightfully be proud. I have worked every day to be true to that pledge and I am very proud of all that we have accomplished.

Together, we have put the City on a very strong financial foundation, improved city services, expanded our parks system, expanded many fold the number of our residents who are involved in our parks and athletic programs, preserved important green spaces, dedicated the new City Hall, enhanced the quality of streets, expanded the miles of our sidewalks and paths to connect our neighborhoods, expanded parks and recreation opportunities to all segments of our society including – importantly - the disabled who now have opportunities we could only dream of a few years ago. I express my thanks to the City Council, and all who have served on the Council over the years. We have faced many challenging times and difficult decisions over the years, and I have always been proud to observe that their professionalism and integrity have set an example which should be emulated in every City. We are very fortunate indeed to attract to the public service such individuals deserving of the respect of the citizens and the region.

I express my thanks to all of you. You inspired me to give the City its motto of being “The City of Volunteers”. It is because of the devotion of all of you who find a way to give back to the community by volunteering in your neighborhoods, your places of worship, the schools, coaching the kids, for the City, and in so many other ways that Chesterfield has become the great City that is. Thanks for all that you do and for all the support you have given to me and my family over the years.

Most of all, I want to thank my family. Over the past decade, Bridget, Jack, James, Elizabeth, and Katie have known many days and nights when I was not home because of commitments elsewhere. I know they have become known to many of you and we are grateful for all of the friendships we have made and will keep through the years. Without their love and support my service simply would not have been possible.

Thank you for the privilege of serving as your Mayor.

A trained facilitator from the Small Business & Technology Development Center, who is an expert in peer learning, maintains balanced discussions to release the genius of the group. Participants learn from the experience of

others rather than getting advice from others.

Roundtable criteria include:

1) Participants must be for-profit business owners, CEOs or primary decision-makers.

- 2) Businesses must have at least five employees and minimum revenue of \$500,000.
- 3) Participants must be willing to commit to the program for one year.
- 4) Businesses must be located in Chesterfield.

The roundtable will hold monthly, four-hour sessions for 12 months, beginning Oct. 13, in Chesterfield. The program fee is \$79 per month for twelve months. Total payment of \$948 is due at the first meeting.

## Four Metro routes now serve the City

Since voters of Chesterfield and other communities in St. Louis County invested their trust and new financial resources through passage of Proposition A, Metro has made several changes and upgrades to the system.

The transit agency has restored services, added 20 new bus routes and increased MetroLink train frequency by 25 percent.



### Metro

Metro is hiring 120 new operators and other support staff needed to restore service, not to mention that the expanded services are enabling hundreds of people to connect to jobs, including more than 800 who work in Chesterfield businesses, and many Chesterfield commuters who work in Clayton and downtown St. Louis.

Due to increased demand, Chesterfield now has four bus routes serving residents and businesses! The routes and prominent stop information are listed to the right. Fares range from \$2 one way to \$2.75 round-trip. A weekly pass is \$23.50 and a monthly pass is \$68. MetroBus fare is purchased on the bus, and exact cash fare is required.

For residents headed to work or a meeting in Clayton, expect that ride to take approximately 35 minutes from Chesterfield Mall. Then, it's an easy ride downtown from there on MetroLink to catch a game or get to work without worrying about traffic! ## Fireball Run will make a pit stop in Chesterfield Sept. 30

Chesterfield will be a stop near the finish line of the 2010 Fireball Run Adventurally, a 3,500-mile motoring rally.

Competitors are expected to arrive at the Chesterfield stop Thursday, Sept. 30, between 5 and 7 p.m. at St. Louis Motorsports (Lamborghini/Bentley dealerships), the host location. The public is invited to view the specialized vehicles participating in the race. Villa Farotto will have food and beverage for sale, and Blues Plus will provide entertainment.

The next morning at 9 a.m., competitors will line up in front of St. Louis Motorsports at I Arnage Blvd., to begin the next leg to Cedar Rapids, IA, with Chesterfield Mayor John Nations waving the green flag to restart the race. Teams will travel over 3,500 miles in nine days, driving vehicles such as Lamborghinis, Dodge Challengers, the *Back to the Future* car, and *KITT from Knight Rider*. Along the way, teams look for clues and complete challenges to earn points. In addition, there are racing challenges, the first of

which will take place at the Las Vegas Motor Speedway.

Proceeds help the recovery effort for missing and exploited children. Each team is assigned a child from its home region along with posters to disperse along the route. A decal featuring the child is affixed to the vehicle. To date, the effort has assisted in the recovery of 33 missing children.

Participants in this year's Fireball Run include the noted Lamborghini test driver, Valentino Balboni; CEO of Luxury Lifestyle, Jacques Milon; CNN commentator and president of the Klaas Kids Foundation, Marc



Klaas; and president of USAC Racing, Kevin Miller.

The Fireball Run Adventurally is safety sanctioned by the United States Auto Club (USAC) and has been welcomed by city leaders and law enforcement in many cities.

### Course offered for small business owners

### Have Rover go in tall clover ... and other valuable tips for pet walks

Calling all Chesterfield dogs to help keep our water clean. And residents whose canine pals don't read *The Citizen* might need to help out, too.

Here's the scoop on the situation:

Pet waste left in yards comes into contact with stormwater when it rains. The stormwater then becomes contaminated and carries pollutants into storm sewers, which drain the untreated water directly to area streams.

Dogs are major contributors to this environmental problem, though other pets have been known to chip in. Together, however, we can make a difference.

Acceptable pet waste management options include:

- Put the waste in a sealed bag and place in the trash.
- Flush down the toilet (do not flush plastic bags or kitty litter.)
- Bury waste in the soil at least six inches deep (away from gardens).

Minimize pollution by having pets do their No. 2 in tall grass away from storm inlets. This acts as a filter and allows for natural decomposition.

Dog and cat waste must be handled carefully because it contains bacteria, viruses and parasites that can infect humans and cause serious illness. Always wash your hands after handling pet waste.

Do not place pet waste in compost piles or around vegetable gardens where pathogens can contaminate food products. All poop is not created equal and depends on the donor's diet. While the by-products of veggie eaters (cows, horses) make good fertilizer, avoid using that of carnivores such as dogs and cats.

### The skinny on trimming street trees

Tree trimming is an ongoing activity as the City's street tree population matures.

The Street Maintenance Division of the Department of Planning & Public Works systematically trims trees along City streets to provide adequate clearance for vehicles and pedestrians. Trimming is also necessary to maintain the health of the trees. Please note that the City's responsibility is limited to those trees located within a public right of way. Trees located on private property are the responsibility of the property owner.

Trees are trimmed on a five-year cycle and are also trimmed ahead

of scheduled street reconstruction projects, and in response to storm damage. The trees are cut back to provide 12 feet of clearance over streets, and 10 feet of clearance over sidewalks.

Prior to initiating tree trimming operations in an area, the Street Maintenance Division distributes notices to all adjacent property owners. Residents who want to trim the street trees in front of their homes themselves are asked to contact the Street Maintenance Division at 636.537.4000. It is important to note that all street trees must be trimmed to the City's specifications.

### Waste, recycling rate has changed

Trash talk is cheap. Getting it picked up, however, is costing just a

little bit more.

As a result of previous negotiations between the City and Allied Waste, rates for residential garbage and recycling collection

services will increase only 37 cents a month, effective Aug. 1. The new rate of \$12.74/month (\$38.22/quarter) is guaranteed for 12 months, through July 31, 2011.

### Pedestrian bridge will help citizens safely cross Highway 40/I-64

A pedestrian bridge is being planned to span Highway 40/I-64 just west of Chesterfield Parkway East. And more signs for bicyclists on city roads are on the way.

These improvements stem from a long-range plan to increase bicycle and pedestrian accessibility, connectivity, and safety. The plan was developed by the City of Chesterfield in partnership with Trailnet, Inc. in April 2009.

Earlier this year, the City Council adopted the Chesterfield Bikeable Walkable Community Plan to enhance the transportation, recreation, and fitness infrastructure in Chesterfield. The plan presents goals and objectives, delineates bicycle and pedestrian facility components, and concludes with a detailed implementation strategy.

It is a tool to help City staff and elected officials implement future infrastructure improvements in the City as resources and local support become available.

The Howard R. Green Company is designing the pedestrian structure crossing Highway 40. It's one of many projects recommended in the plan to remove pedestrian barriers and help facilitate safe pedestrian travel on roadways around Chesterfield.

### It's full steam ahead on Monarch-Chesterfield Levee Trail

Construction of two new sections of the Monarch-Chesterfield Levee Trail is underway.

L. Krupp Construction was selected to build the levee trail from the north and west end near the Chesterfield Valley Athletic

Complex to the Howell Island Access. The trail will follow the levee for most of the segment – except at Boone's Bridge where the trail will go under Highway 40.

The trail is expected to be completed next spring. With this addition, the north link of the trail

will stretch more than 6 miles. The following phase will connect Howell Island to Centaur Road and is expected to be constructed next year.

### City opens an express lane for municipal zoning reviews

Chesterfield's Planning and Development Services Department is excited to offer a new service – Express MZA Review.

This service provides same-day review for all municipal zoning applications (MZA) for interior remodeling, finishing, or other work within a residential structure. To receive same-day

turnaround, applications must be submitted by 10 a.m. and include all necessary documents and signatures. These applications will be reviewed and ready for pick-up by 3 p.m. the same day.

Approval of the MZA is the first step in obtaining a building permit with St. Louis County. Once the MZA is approved, the paperwork

is submitted to St. Louis County for final review and issuance of a building permit.

### Don't stay in the dark – how to report a non-functioning street light

Each residential subdivision is responsible for the streetlights within the subdivision. The trustees of subdivisions lease the lights from AmerenUE.

You can either notify your trustees, or report the light directly to AmerenUE at 314.342.1000. Note the pole number before calling and give AmerenUE

this number along with the address of the light.

The pole number is on a tag which is typically located at the top of the pole, just under the fixture.

### Chesterfield Police sets AARP driver course

Older drivers can tune up their driving skills Oct. 5. The Chesterfield Police Department presents the AARP Driver Safety Program from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at City Hall.

The course is the nation's first and largest classroom driver improvement course for drivers 50 and over. It reviews the rules of the road with an emphasis on defensive driving practices. The four-hour course is taught in a single morning session and does not involve a test.

The course fee is \$12 for AARP members, \$14 for non-members. Graduates of the course may be eligible for a discount from their auto insurance carrier.

### Community Emergency Response Team offers volunteer training

The next opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills to become an auxiliary first responder during emergencies starts Sept. 15.

That's when the 24-hour Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training program begins, under the auspices of the Chesterfield Police Department and the Monarch Fire Protection District.

The CERT program provides an effective first-responder capability with the aid of citizen involvement. Acting as individuals or in teams during a disaster, trained CERT volunteers can fan out within a particular neighborhood or business complex, extinguishing small fires, performing light search and rescue, and rendering basic first aid for disaster victims.

Individual civilian volunteers are trained as neighborhood,

business, and government teams to serve as auxiliary first responders. These groups provide immediate assistance to victims in their area, organize spontaneous volunteers who have not had training, and collect disaster intelligence that will assist professional responders with prioritization and allocation of resources following a disaster.

CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens can make a difference.

Recycle Bins will be located in Dierbergs parking lot. This year textiles will be collected as well as single stream recyclables.

## Textile Recycling Guidelines

- Blankets, linens, towels and paired shoes are accepted.
- Clothing and linens should be placed in bags.
- Shoes can be boxed or bagged separately.

Please do not include:

Hangers, wet clothing, pillows, rugs, metal cleated shoes, skates, spiked heels, material scraps, severely damaged shoes and clothing

## Single Stream Recycling Guidelines

Accepting:

Plastics #1, #2, #3, #4, #5, & #7, aluminum cans, trays & foil, packaging & gable top containers (milk and juice cartons), tin cans, paper of any kind (no metal clips, spirals, ring binders), chipboard (cereal, gift boxes, etc.), carrier stock (soda carrying cases), paperback books (no hard-cover books).



## Container Criteria

- All containers are to be empty and rinsed.
- No motor oil, insecticide, herbicide or hazardous chemical containers.
- No plastic film (no plastic sheets, tarps, or wrap).
- No expanded foam or clear polystyrene.

September is Archaeology Month in Missouri, a state-wide celebration of discoveries and events in human history. Two discussions on archaeology, both free and open to the public, are scheduled at Chesterfield's Sachs Branch of the St. Louis County Library.

### The Dampier Site: A 1000-Year-Old Ceremonial and Market Center

Uncovered on the Missouri River Floodplain  
Wednesday, Sept. 15, 7 p.m.

Speaker Joe Harl, Archaeological Research Center

The Dampier Site was uncovered in Chesterfield 5-6 feet below the surface during digging for levee improvements on the Missouri River floodplain. Just as various stores and restaurants use this valley today, nearly 1000 years ago people established a large market at

the Dampier Site. Archaeologists have uncovered shops that sold ornate pottery, including several pieces from the lower Mississippi River valley, marine shell beads and whelk shells from the Gulf of Mexico, copper ornaments from the Great Lakes, mica from the Appalachian Mountains, and pumice from the Rocky Mountains.

The Dampier Site is providing great insight into the overall Mississippian economic and social system and helps explain the influence Cahokia in Illinois exerted on east-central Missouri.

### Talking Turkey: Archaeological Treasures of Asia Minor

# Butterfly House welcomes owls, orchids in October

The Butterfly House isn't using the alphabet to schedule events. It's a coincidence that October will feature owls and orchids.

All month, the Faust Park attraction will be host to nearly 100 blooming orchids in its 8,000-square-foot tropical conservatory. And, the collection of owl butterflies will expand from 150 to approximately 2,000 for the month. The October Owls and Orchids experience is included with Butterfly House admission.

Owl butterflies (*Caligo eurilochus*, *Caligo atreus* and *Caligo memnon*) are most recognizable at roost, when the markings on the underside of their wings are prominently displayed. The name comes from these markings, which resemble a bright yellow owl eye, surrounded by rich, chocolate-colored feathers – a useful defense mechanism to scare away predators. Hungry owl butterflies feast on a diet of carrion, tree sap or juice from decaying fruit in the wilds of their native Costa Rica and Surinam. At the Butterfly House, strategically-placed tree trunks slathered in squashed banana will be on the menu throughout the month.

"Our owl butterflies will cling to fruit-covered trees during the day, so it's an ideal time for guests to get an easy, up-close look at large groups of these fascinating animals," said Mark



Deering, collections manager at the Butterfly House. "No where else in the world will you find this concentration of owl butterflies."

Owl butterflies are most animated at dawn and dusk. While other creatures are settling in for the night, owl butterflies swoop through the conservatory at top speeds in groups of a dozen or more, seeking out food and mates. Tuesdays offer an opportunity to see the action, with expanded hours from 4 to 7 p.m. Visitors may explore on their own or take a guided tour with

Butterfly House staff at 6 p.m.

Real owls from the World Bird Sanctuary will make a guest appearance Tuesday, Oct. 19, 5:30-6:30 p.m.

Throughout October, the Lopata Learning Lab features hands-on family activities designed for ages 3-12. Visitors can see the four stages of an owl butterfly's life, make a colorful orchid mask, experience different smells and textures, play matching games, and paint with watercolors.

Meanwhile, nearly 100 blooming orchids will provide a treat for both the eyes and the nose. Stroll through the warm conservatory to spot *Phalaenopsis*, *Cattleyas* and *Dendrobiums* in all their glory, nestled alongside peacock flowers, powder puff trees, jungle geraniums and other tropical plants. Bring along your camera; hand-held photography is welcome for personal use only. Tripods, monopods and external flash equipment are not permitted.


